

THE GREAT DILEMMA

The Christian life is full of paradoxes. Many great truths have a seemingly opposite truth that must be kept in balance. Resting in God vs working for Him. Stepping out in faith vs using God-given logic and reason. Extravagant giving vs wise stewardship. Mercy vs justice. The mature Christian learns to live with these tensions. But the greatest (and most misunderstood) tension is probably between the fact of God's presence with us and our ongoing desire for more of Him.

- Jesus gives us living water, so that we never need to thirst (John 4:10-14) so why do we still thirst for God?
- Jesus said He would be with us always, even to the end of the age (Matt 28:20, John 14:23), yet it still feels like we come into His presence when we pray, worship, etc.
- In one sense we already know God (John 14:17, 2 Tim 1:12, 1 John 5:20) yet Paul still talks about pressing on to know Him (Phil 3:10).
- If Christ is already in us (immanent), are we wrong to reach out in worship as though He were outside us (and transcendent)?

There seems to be a gap between the promises of God and our actual experience. Does this point to something defective in our faith? Or is it meant to be? Are we meant to live this side of Heaven with an unstoppable hunger for God in our hearts?
